## **PUBLIC HEARINGS AND INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES**

7. **Placing the Cost of Abating Hazardous Vegetation on the Property Tax Assessment Roll (Resolution/Roll Call Vote)**

Recommended Action: That the City Council adopt a Resolution placing the cost of abating hazardous vegetation on the property tax assessment roll.

This is the time and place for a public hearing to consider placing the cost of abating hazardous vegetation on the property tax assessment roll.

Community Development Director, Rob Eastwood presented a Staff Report dated August 3, 2021, stating that on December 1, 2020, City Council declared weeds to be a public nuisance allowing the County to send notices to property owners whose properties were overgrown with weeds. On January 19, 2021, City Council held a public hearing considering property owner protests and directing the County to proceed with abatement on those properties where weeds were not voluntarily removed by the owners. Following the final report from the County, 33 properties were identified for fee assessments on the property tax rolls.

Mayor Gibbons opened the public hearing, there being no one wishing to speak, the public hearing was closed.

## **NEW BUSINESS**

8. **Special Event Permit for Boogie Music Festival REMIXED (Resolution/Roll Call Vote)**

Recommended Action: That the City Council adopt a Resolution approving the issuance of a Special Event Permit for the Chamber of Commerce Boogie Music Festival REMIXED, subject to the finding and conditions of approval, including complying with all COVID-19 recommendations set by the State of California Department of Public Health (CDPH) regarding Outdoor Mega Events and approving a waiver of all associated review and permit fees and 50% of associated City staff and equipment costs.

Councilwoman Landry reported that she had been in previous conversations with Ken Johnson, Downtown Campbell Chamber of Commerce, relating to the Boogie Music Festival REMIXED and had volunteered for this event in the past, and if approved, has volunteered for this year's event as well.

Police Chief Gary Berg presented the Staff Report dated August 3, 2021 and noted that the Boogie Music Festival was last approved in 2018 when Council adopted a Resolution authorizing this event for up to five years. However, given current COVID circumstances, Staff felt it best to bring this event to Council for approval. Staff is recommending that the City require all California Public Health Department (CPHD) regulations for outdoor mega events be followed. The Downtown Campbell Chamber of Commerce is requesting a 100% permit fee waiver and a 50% equipment and staff cost waiver for this event.

In response to inquiries from Mayor Gibbons and Councilmember Lopez, Finance Director Will Fuentes stated that there is the possibility that the City will be able to recuperate the costs of this event with the American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds, and if not, there is funding available in the General Fund to cover these expenses without requiring a budget adjustment.

Ken Johnson, Downtown Campbell Chamber of Commerce Representative stated that this year's event will be slightly smaller than in years past and will be compliant with all California Public Health Department regulations. The event will host a County of Santa Clara pop-up vaccination clinic and the messaging will be encouraging masks, vaccinations, and testing. There will be masks available for attendees at all ticket and information booths. Volunteers and Staff will be required to wear masks as well.

In response to an inquiry from Councilmember Lopez, Mr. Johnson stated that he is in constant contact with the County and the CPHD for guidance and regulations relating to COVID-19 and stated the intent is to have a safe and family friendly event, noting that the event has been modified to adapt to changing circumstances and they will continue to do so.

Mayor Gibbons expressed concern relating to holding a mega event, without vaccination status checking.

Mr. Johnson stated that the Chamber is following all required regulations from the County and the State and noted that requiring vaccination status is not a requirement at this time. Such an effort would be prohibitive for them due to lack of volunteer resources and manpower.

Councilmember Bybee stated that she supports the event and is looking forward to it but did express concern about the excess availability of alcohol, with the restaurants now being allowed to serve outside of the restaurant.

Mr. Johnson noted that he understands the concern and will be speaking with the area restaurants to assist in managing the alcohol consumption. The festival is utilizing specific glassware that is known to the Campbell Police Department as well so that the festival drinks can be differentiated from the local area restaurant drinks. Mayor Gibbons and Councilwoman Landry both expressed support for this measure.

In response to an inquiry from Councilmember Lopez, Mr. Johnson stated that he will work with his team on a concerted effort to check the vaccination status or testing of all volunteers and vendors working the event.

9. **Virtual Reality Technology for Crisis Intervention Training**

Recommended Action: Provide feedback to the Santa Clara County Cities Association regarding its consideration and recommendation to encourage public safety departments within the County to utilize virtual reality technology for crisis intervention/de-escalation training.

Councilmember Bybee stated that as the City’s representative to the Santa Clara County Cities Association, she is bringing this item to Council to seek feedback on its consideration and recommendation to encourage public safety departments within the County to utilize virtual reality technology for crisis intervention/de-escalation training.

City Manager Loventhal explained that the Cities Association formed a racial justice committee looking for ways to form partnerships across the 15 Santa Clara County Cities to make progress in public safety reform among other areas. One area of focus for the Committee is increasing the support and utilization of virtual reality in training programs for officers.

In response to an inquiry from Councilmember Lopez and Vice Mayor Resnikoff, Police Chief Gary Berg noted that the AXON contract recently approved by Council includes the use of virtual reality training for officers. Police Chief Berg noted that in many ways Police training in California is ahead of the curve as compared to other areas across the nation. The feedback from the Police Chief's Association was that instead of identifying one vendor for this type of training, the shared message should be to put a priority on enhanced training for officers including the use of virtual reality training.

Discussion ensued relating to the types of virtual reality training certified officers go through, the types of scenarios that can be programmed into the virtual reality platforms, and the in-person types of trainings that are conducted.

Council confirmed consensus for supporting virtual reality training for officers but does not support the need for all Cities to utilize the same vendors for this training.

**10. Implement Stage 3 Potable Water Restrictions to Correspond with the Water Conservation Goal of 33% Compared to 2013 Usage (Resolution/Roll Call Vote)**

Recommended Action: That the City Council adopt a Resolution to implement Stage 3 drought restrictions based on the Santa Clara Valley Water District's and the San Jose Water Company's water conservation goal of 33% of 2013 usage.

Public Works Director Todd Capurso introduced Environmental Program Specialist Peri Newby.

Environmental Program Specialist Newby reviewed the Staff Report dated August 3, 2021 to implement Stage 3 drought restrictions based on the Santa Clara Valley Water District's and the San Jose Water Company's water conservation goal of 33% of 2013 usage noting that the Board of Directors of the Valley Water and the Santa Clara County Director of Emergency Services declared a water shortage emergency condition related to extreme drought conditions. The City's water retail supplier, San Jose Water implemented Stage 3 of their agency's Water Shortage Contingency Plan.

Environmental Program Specialist Newby explained that Stage 3 restrictions include limiting watering or irrigating lawns or landscape to two days per week, prohibiting the filling or refilling of swimming pools, requiring leaks and broken fixtures to be repaired within 48 hours, and not using potable water for filling or refilling decorative fountains.



Councilwoman Landry expressed concerns about the new landscaping that is planned for the John D. Morgan Park, Campbell Park and the Civic Center given the restrictions we are placing on others to restrict and conserve water.

Public Works Director Capurso explained that the maintenance of landscaping around City buildings and in City parks doesn't require as much watering as the maintenance of turf and sports fields throughout the City and noted that if Stage 4 water restrictions were implemented in the future, these areas would be impacted by those restrictions and the potential complications to these projects would need to be addressed.

In response to an inquiry from Vice Mayor Resnikoff, Public Works Director Capurso noted that the implementation of Stage 3 drought restrictions is really a strategy for educated compliance. With local jurisdictions all sharing the same messaging to residents and customers the goal is to curb water use so that more stringent measures do not have to be taken in the future, such as tracking those with high water use and resulting in an increase in prices.

11. **Redistricting Process for Councilmember District Boundaries**

Recommended Action: That the City Council provide direction to staff regarding the process for redistricting boundary lines for district-based elections, including consideration of utilizing a staff-led process, without a redistricting commission.

City Clerk Christopherson introduced Staff Report dated August 3, 2021, reviewing process options for the redistricting of boundary lines for district-based elections noting that Staff is recommending Council utilize a Staff-led redistricting process where Council holds all public hearings and maintains the authority to adopt the final district boundary map and utilizes a defined community outreach plan.

Councilwoman Landry expressed support for utilizing a Staff-led redistricting process, requested an increase in the number of community workshop meetings and expressed concern regarding the accuracy of the data available from the Census, and for utilizing the same demographer as the previous process in 2019.

In response to an inquiry from Councilwoman Landry, City Manager Loventhal noted that the redistricting process is dependent upon the data received from the U.S. Census Bureau and noted that although there is probably a process for refuting the data provided, the City is obligated to utilize the data provided. Any errors noted in the data would not necessarily be an error by the demographer.

Councilmember Lopez expressed support for utilizing a Staff-led redistricting process noting that he was pleasantly surprised at the number of individuals who participate in the last Staff-led districting process. Councilmember Lopez expressed a desire to hold more than one community outreach meeting and at least one virtually if possible. Councilmember Lopez expressed caution that obtaining the census data after the September 30, 2021 deadline date could be possible and we should be prepared for that contingency. Councilmember Lopez stated that given the circumstances surrounding the census taking in 2020, it is very possible that there are an elevated number of errors obtained in the data this year, and that is something every jurisdiction is going to need to deal with, not something that is necessarily an error by the demographer.

Vice Mayor Resnikoff expressed support for utilizing a Staff-led redistricting process and felt the process in 2019 was successful, he cautioned future potential census errors and stated that this redistricting process should be a smoother process as we are refining current maps to updated population numbers and not starting from a blank slate. Vice Mayor Resnikoff is supportive of holding an additional one or two community workshop meetings and would like to see the schedule moved up a bit to allow more time for candidates to consider running in the 2022 election.

Councilmember Bybee stated that she supports a Staff-led redistricting process and felt the turnout in 2019 was very good and it produced a good districting map. Councilmember Bybee would like to increase the number of community workshop meetings and hold at least one at the Community Center instead of City Hall as it is more conducive to a workshop format.

Discussion ensued among Councilmembers relating to the fringes around the district boundaries and limiting disenfranchisement of any one area by slightly modifying the maps based on the new population data rather than starting with brand new maps.

Mayor Gibbons expressed concern relating to the proposed schedule and process timeline and requested it be more expeditiously completed as there could be impacts to those individuals who may want to run in the 2022 election cycle and boundaries will need to be identified in time for that process.

Council confirmed consensus for utilizing a Staff-led redistricting process, increasing the number of community outreach meetings, and for reviewing the process schedule and timeline for ways to complete the redistricting process sooner.

12. **Designation of Voting Delegate and Alternate for 2021 League of California Cities Annual Conference**

Recommended Action: That the City Council designate a Voting Delegate and Alternate(s) for the League of California Cities Annual Conference General Business Meeting to be held on September 24, 2021.

City Clerk Christopherson introduced the Staff Report dated August 3, 2021, noting that this item is a request from the League of California Cities seeking selection of two Councilmembers to serve as voting delegates for the Annual Conference General Business Meeting being held on September 24, 2021, in Sacramento.

Mayor Gibbons opened the floor for any interested Councilmembers to attend. Councilmember Lopez volunteered to serve as the City of Campbell's voting delegate. No other Councilmembers being available, Mayor Gibbons volunteered to serve as the alternate voting delegate and will plan to attend if the conference is held virtually, but expressed reservations for attending an in person event.

**COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS**

13. **Council Committee Reports**

Recommended Action: Report on committee assignments and general comments.

Councilmember Bybee attended the Finance Subcommittee meeting and the Wine Walk in Downtown Campbell held on July 23, 2021.

Councilwoman Landry attended the Nuro autonomous delivery vehicle demonstration noting this is the delivery only vehicle that is not designed to carry passengers and attended a Home Instead ribbon cutting ceremony. The Santa Clara Valley Water District, County Water Commission held a meeting and voted to "Recommend the Valley Water Board of Directors write letters to the State,

Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) with the Commission's concerns of the limited water resources, the length of the construction of Anderson Dam, that the requirement of the current Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) numbers be revisited so that there is more data at which time the balancing housing growth to sustainable water demand and supply and housing development will be within a scope that is feasible given available water supply over the planning time-period."

Councilmember Lopez reported that no meetings were held.

Vice Mayor Resnikoff attended the Finance Subcommittee meeting, the Wine Walk in Downtown Campbell, and the Silicon Valley Animal Control Authority (SVACA) meeting noting that SVACA has a 99% live release rate which is near perfect when you consider some animals brought in require euthanasia due to injury or illness.

Mayor Gibbons reported that the Campbell Historical Museum & Ainsley House Foundation is seeking new Board Members and are restarting their fundraising efforts following the flood of the museum. The Silicon Valley Clean Energy Authority meets next week and will be reviewing the budget for October 2021 through September 2022. The West Valley Mayors and Managers met and discussed housing growth and water capacity concerns. The County of Santa Clara Public Health Department held a meeting with all area Mayor and Managers to discuss the Delta variant and noted this is the most aggressive virus in documented history and were encouraging all local officials to consider a vaccine mandate in their workplaces with continued testing as an alternate.
